Zidovudine

FORM Vial containing 200mg in 20ml

INDICATION Prophylaxis against vertical transmission of HIV to neonate in unwell

infants or those unable to tolerate oral

DOSE RANGE

AGE	DOSE	FREQUENCY	ROUTE
< 34 weeks	1.5mg/kg	Every 12 hours*	IV
≥ 34 weeks	1.5mg/kg	Every 6 hours	IV

^{*} increase to every 6 hours once 34+0 weeks CGA

Reconstitution Already in solution. MUST be diluted prior to use

Dilution

Zidovudine inj 10mg/ml 2ml
Glucose 5% Up to 10ml total

Gives a 2mg in 1ml solution. Use the required volume

Method of Administration IV Infusion over 60 minutes

Solution incompatibility	Other IV Fluids	
IV Line compatibility	Aciclovir, amphotericin, clindamycin, dobutamine, dopamine, morphine, piperacillin with tazobactam, potassium chloride, rocuronium, vancomycin, vecuronium Compatible with erythromycin when diluted in sodium chloride only	
IV Line incompatibility	Meropenem
