Ketamine	
FORM	Vials containing 200mg in 20mls

Vial containing 50mg in 1ml – to be used if 200mg/20ml concentration is unavailable due to shortage (requires dilution – see below)

**INDICATION** Anaesthesia during intubation of neonates with hypoplastic left heart syndrome / unstable circulation NB: Consultant initiation only.

Neonate	2mg/kg	Produces 5 – 10 mins of anaesthesia	IV over 60 seconds
